RE: February 2026 monthly report

- In December 2025, the Waupaca County Crime Stoppers as an organization voted to dissolve its association. Their members voted to disperse the money in their account to law enforcement agencies. We received a check for \$2,789.06, and they asked that the money be used for a project for "public purpose." Immediately, a project came to mind that I believe would assist our community and qualify for a public purpose. As we all know, Clintonville has many travelers passing through the city, notably on weekends when people are traveling north. On S. Main St., we receive many concerns about motorist speeds, and I felt that purchasing a radar speed sign to be permanently located in the S. Main St. area would be beneficial to our city. This will raise awareness among traveling motorists and help slow traffic. Justin McAuly and I worked together to find a location in the South Main St. area where we felt this radar board would have the most impact. We felt the ideal location would be the northbound lane in front of the old Shopko building. Justin submitted the plans and permit to the Wisconsin DOT, and we were approved. There are many guidelines to follow when putting up a sign. I want to commend the work Justin did on researching and working with the DOT to get this approved. The majority of the grant will cover the purchase of this sign and the solar panel to power it. Justin and I have found money in our respective budgets to cover the remaining costs. We hope to see improvements in this area, and next year we will purchase another one for southbound traffic in the area of Second Street. We expect to receive the sign-in in early May. I have attached a photo of the sign we have purchased.
- Officer Carter McPheron started with our department as a part-time patrol officer in early February. He is currently in our field training process. On March 2nd, he finished phase one of our field training process and has progressed well to move on to phase two. Staff members in the department spent several months updating our field training process, and I am excited about the finished product. If you see Officer McPheron out and about, please welcome him to our city.
- The Clintonville Police Department is participating with several Waupaca County law enforcement agencies in traffic enforcement. The Waupaca County Sheriff's Office applied for and received grant funding for OWI enforcement, speed enforcement, and seatbelt enforcement. This is a countywide initiative that enables departments to have an extra officer on duty specifically for traffic enforcement. All officers' overtime and benefits are reimbursed to the department. I am making you aware of this when you review our overtime hours or see an extra officer working.
- This time of the year is when officers are attending many hours of training. Law Enforcement Officers in Wisconsin are required to complete at least 24 hours of training each year to maintain their state certifications. Since the Clintonville Range and Training Center has opened, we have been able to host in-house services for members of our department. Before the range and training center, we did not have a good space to host these types of training. This has also allowed us to bring in instructors from in-state and out-of-state to come and instruct. This has been beneficial for us as a host agency, as we often receive free training spots.
- We are doing very well with our staffing in dispatch, full-time, and part-time. We have been doing well over the last several months and hope this continues. We are aware that two of our part-time clerk-dispatchers are currently enrolled in college in law enforcement and hope to attend the law enforcement academy this summer. We know that in the near future, we will be looking to

- add more part-time clerk-dispatchers.
- As most of you have heard by now, Captain Dennis Schroeder intends to retire in June of 2026 after faithfully serving this city for 34 years. I say this with mixed emotions as Captain Schroeder has served this community with pride and professionalism for 34 years; his expertise in investigating and leading will be truly missed. I am excited to see him cross the finish line and enjoy the things he loves outside of work. With his upcoming retirement, there will be many moves within the department with promotions and hiring.
 - As spring is here, we will increase our proactive ordinance enforcement of nuisance properties. I know some of you were skeptical that we would not be hiring a CSO, as you felt we needed to give extra attention to ordinance enforcement. Rest assured, before we had a CSO, our officers always handled these types of complaints. There are times when we must set our priorities, and these types of complaints are not high on priority, but we encourage others to contact the police department if they see any violations. We will address those when they come in. We have assigned officers to specific areas of towns where they are responsible for nuisance properties. Our goal with landowners is to achieve voluntary compliance before issuing citations. Unfortunately, there are times when multiple citations are issued before the issue is corrected.
 - On February 20th, we hosted our Gutter Busters event at Memory Lanes. We had 30 school-aged children signed up. This was a chance for officers to bowl and hang out. Children got to bowl and have pizza afterwards. We are fortunate to provide events like this to our youth in our community to enhance relationships between law enforcement and our youth. These events do not use money from our operating budget; we made this possible out of our community policing fund, which we set up in 2021, and our primary fundraising event for these funds is our yearly golf outing.
 - The date is set, August 7th for our golf outing. We have made this event a great success and can draw golfers from outside the area to enjoy our city for the day. We will be opening registration soon. Keep an eye out on our website.
 - On February 27th, officers conducted a traffic stop on a vehicle in the city. K-9 Thor was deployed and alerted on the vehicle. Located in the vehicle were just under 10 grams of suspected crack cocaine and just under 5 grams of suspected methamphetamine. Officers then searched a residence as a result of this arrest and located other evidence of drug use. Officers continue to conduct drug-related investigations proactively.
 - In February, we had several in-depth investigations that required many hours of follow-up. Many of these investigations require many hours of reviewing digital evidence, interviewing witnesses, and gathering evidence in other areas. Oftentimes, due to officers' work schedules, the initial officer turns over an investigation to another officer because they are going on their days off. As technology advances and in-depth investigations become more frequent, I hope to have a dedicated officer assigned as an investigator to ensure that the same officer can devote special attention to these investigations. Staff have done a remarkable job in these investigations.
 - As always, I encourage you to come and do a ride-along with our officers and sit in our dispatch to learn what we do every day. This may give you some insight into what your police department does. This may help you understand questions you may have when you're reviewing the yearly budget or even looking at the monthly bills. I know our staff would enjoy spending time with you and showing you their work. It does not have to be an entire shift; a few hours are welcomed. Please reach out if this interests you.

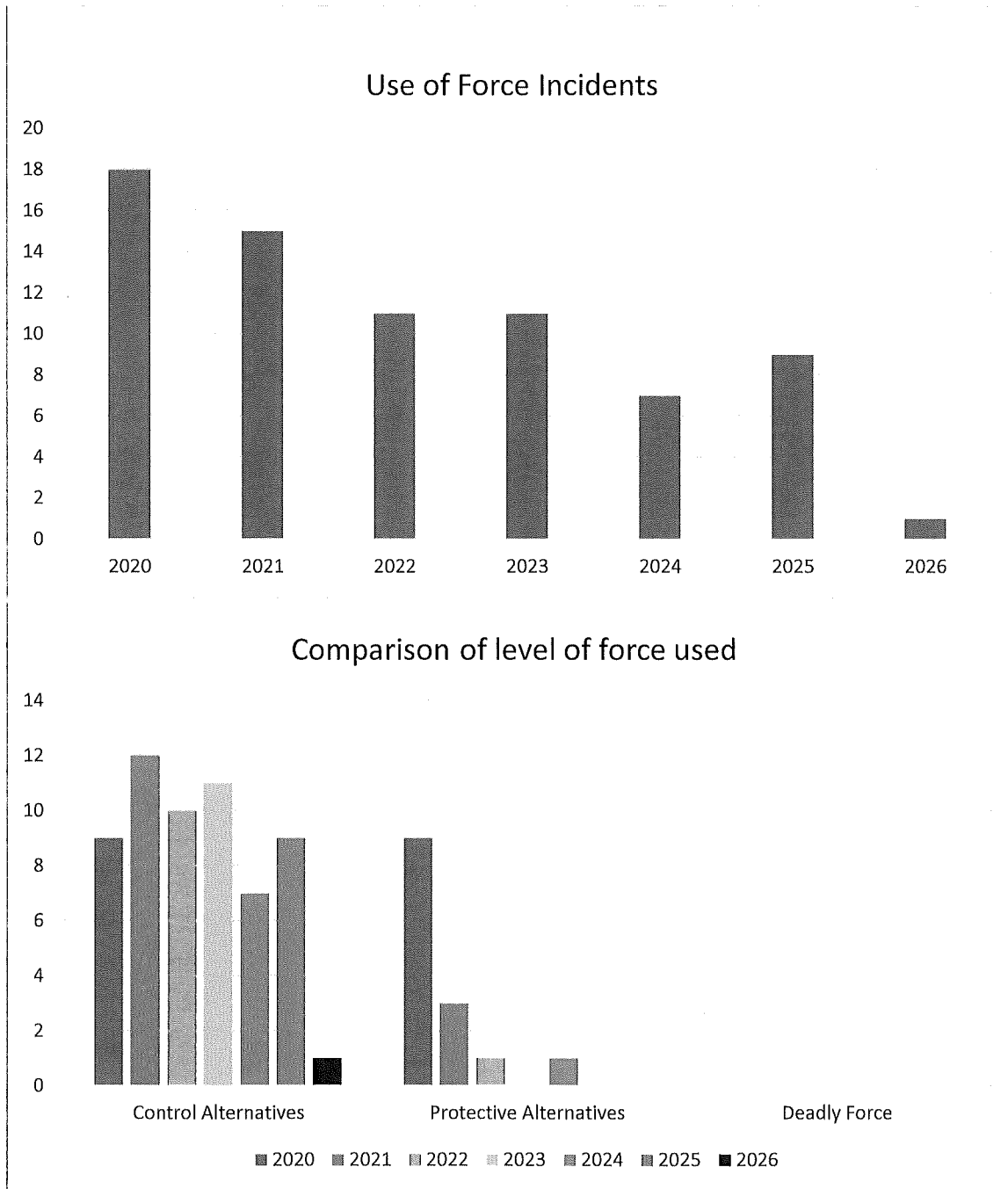

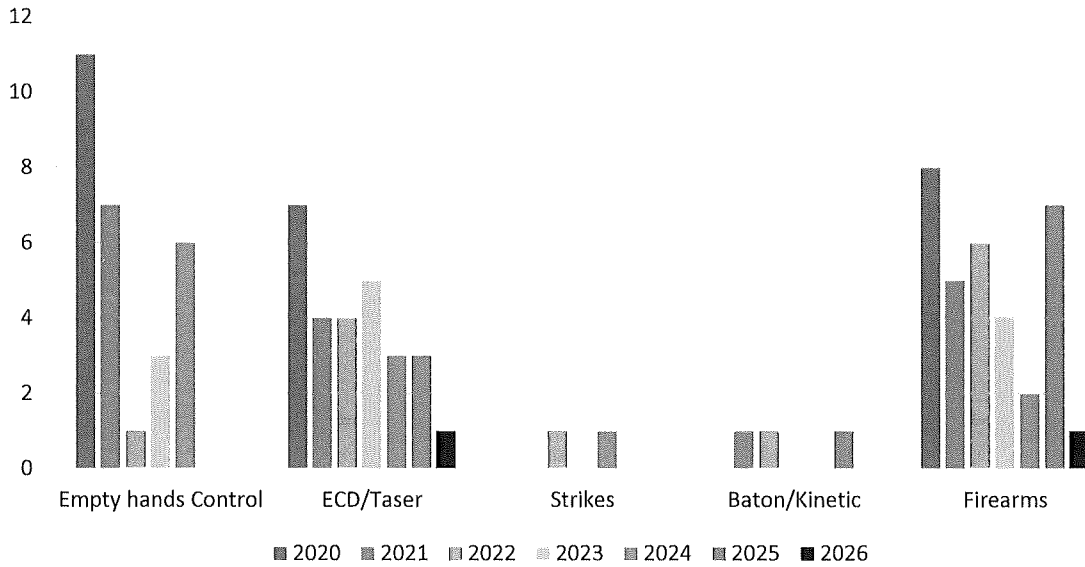

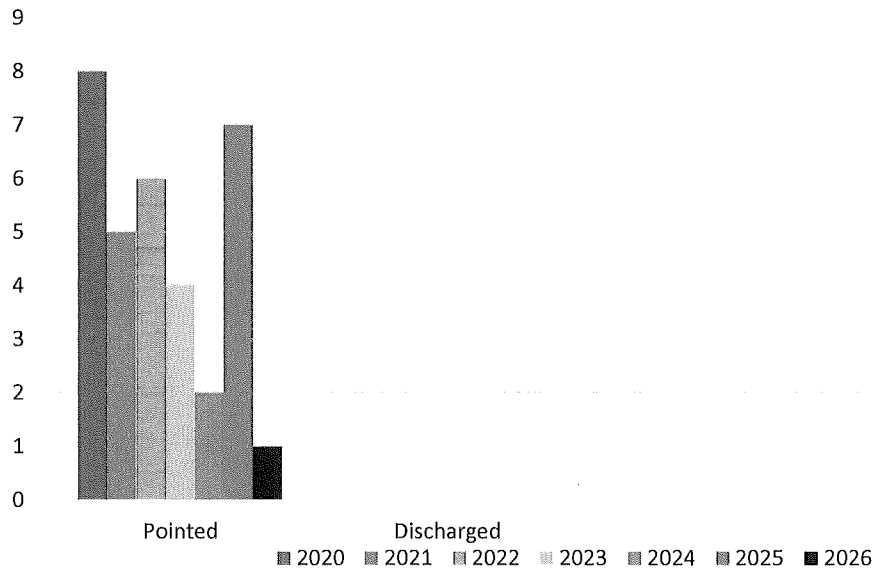
2026 Use of force report



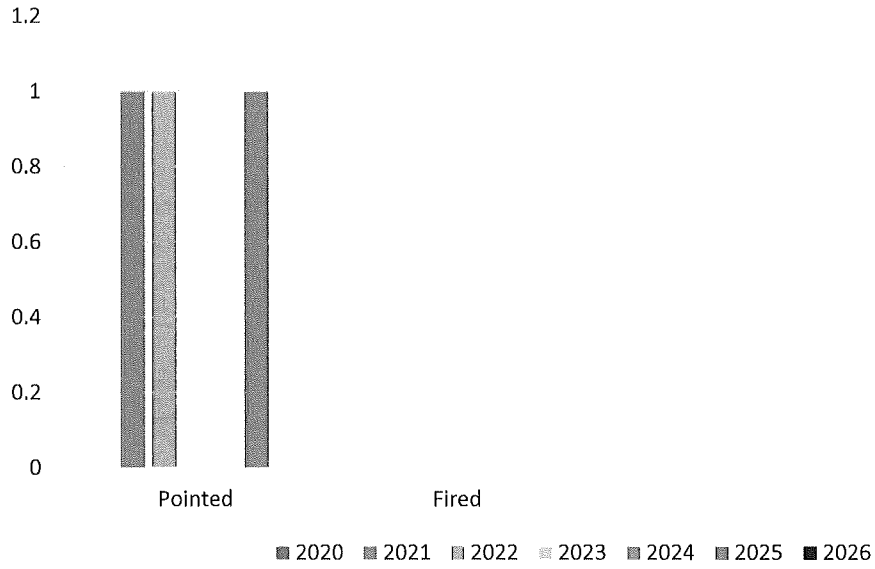

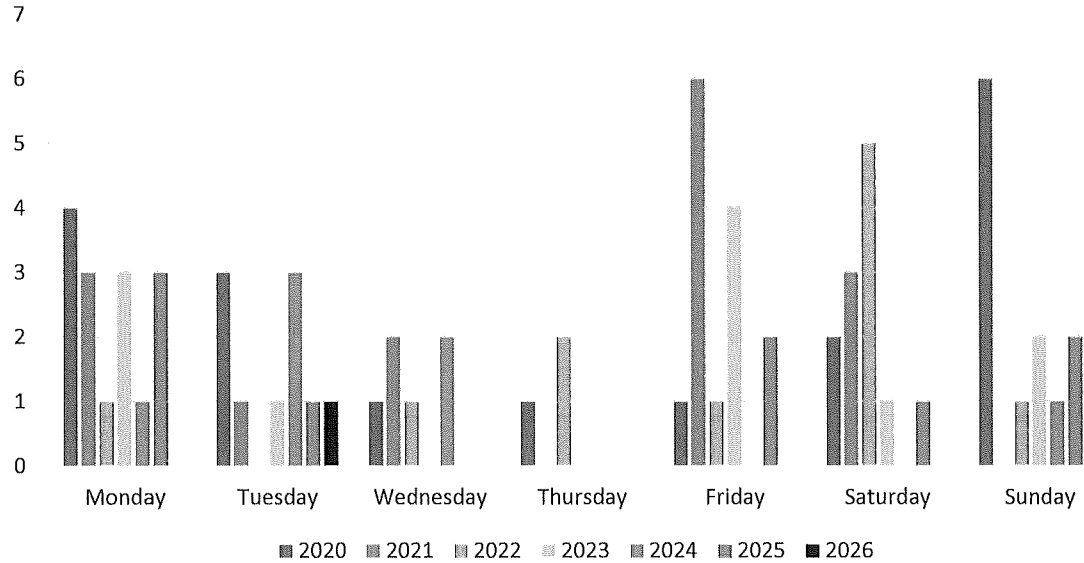
Calls Being Investigated When Use Of Force Was Necessary



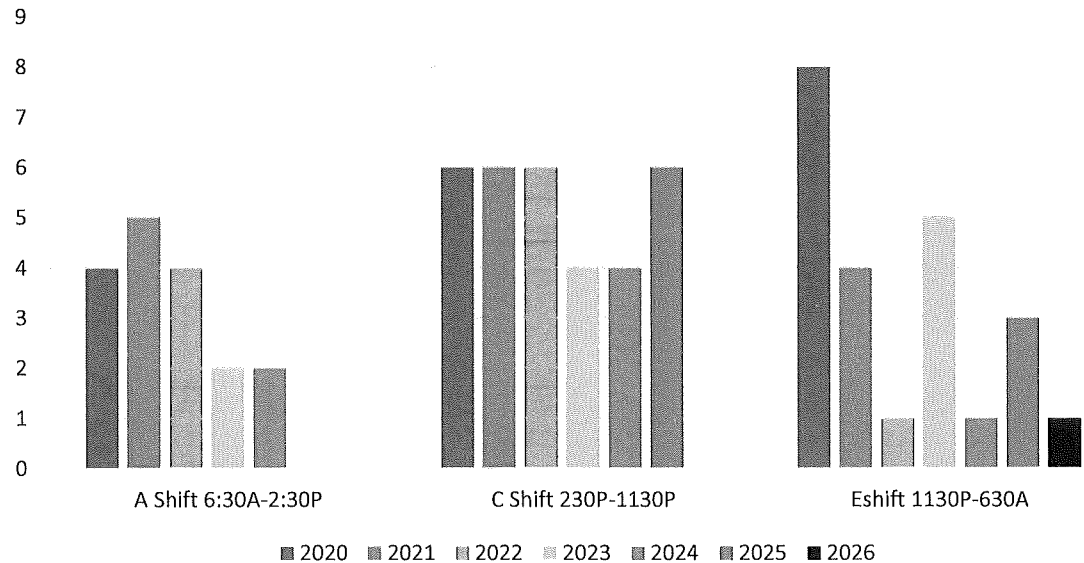

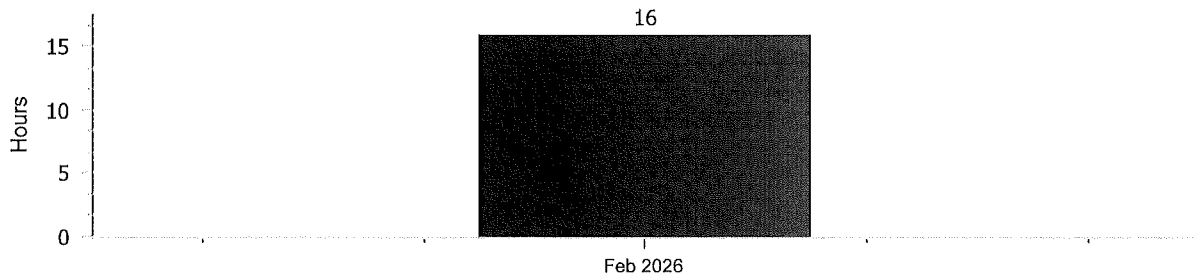
Training By Day Of Week

Detection Exercise Lengths

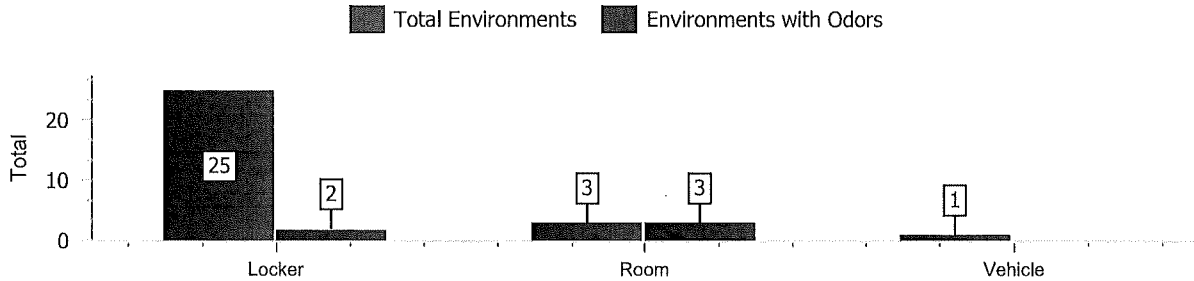

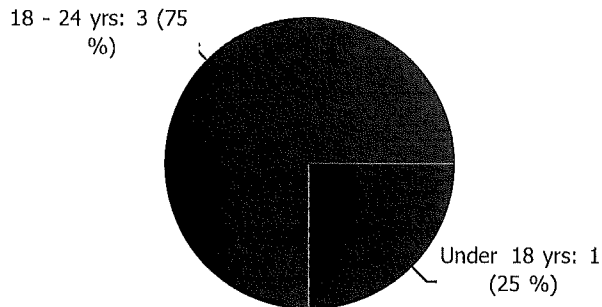
Arrests by Race/Ethnicity

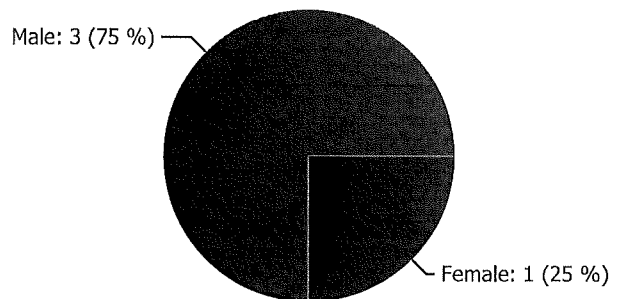
Arrests by Age

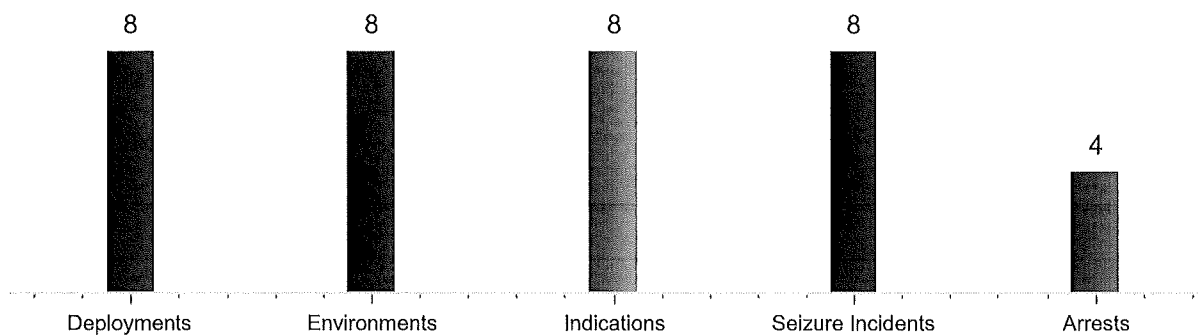

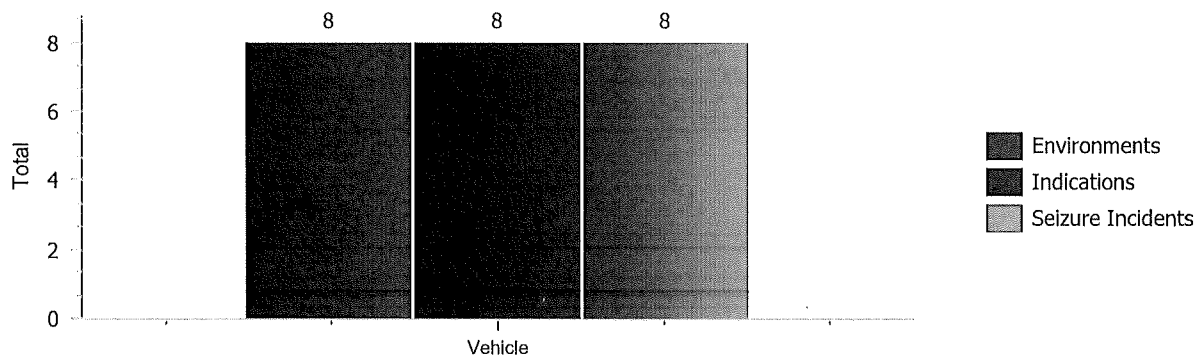
